Policies, Procedures and Expectations

Dear Students and Parents,

Welcome to the 2018-2019 school year at Bear River High School. The World History course is a full-year examination of major historical events, geography, cultures and current issues with an emphasis on democratic struggles and principles. There will be a special focus on how past events affect the present and future course of our world community. As current events are again proving, the importance of gaining as much understanding into our complex and ever-changing world is more important than ever.

NCSS (C3) College, Career, and Civic Life Framework:

The C3 Framework was written to assist states and districts to transform the teaching and learning in the social sciences in a manner that supports the California State Standards and the College Career Anchor Standards. The C3 Framework utilizes an *Inquiry Arch* that reinforces the four Dimensions of informed inquiry in social science: Dimension 1: Developing questions and planning inquiries; Dimension 2: Applying disciplinary concepts and tools; Dimension 3: Evaluating Sources and using evidence; Dimension 4: Communicating conclusions and taking informed action. The C3 Framework is a vehicle that will assist us in our study of World History. The major guideposts for the year are as follows:

First Semester - Rise of democracy in the ancient world, The Age of Enlightenment, The French Revolution, Industrialization and Imperialism.

Second Semester - World War One, The Russian Revolution, The rise of totalitarianism, World War Two, The Holocaust, Post WW II and Cold-War issues, World Cultures, Unresolved Issues of Today, Culminating Research Project.

Classroom Behavior and Expectations:

Grading Policy - Grades are an important measure of academic effort and achievement. We will employ a wide variety of assessment methods to obtain an evaluation of each student's progress throughout the year. Points will be earned through: class participation, projects, group work, tests and quizzes, homework, class notebooks, performances, research paper and enrichment activities. Semester grades are cumulative from the previous quarter. Standard percentage grading scales will be used.

Late Work: 6 late assignments per semester will be accepted for reduced credit. After the maximum of 6 are allowed, then you will be notified and those assignments will be marked down accordingly.

Extra Credit - Extra credit is possible especially if the student has completed all work for the semester. It will be assigned on an individual basis and it is up to the individual to see me some time after class for discussion of options available.

Employability Mark - An employability mark is earned in lieu of a citizenship grade. Students are assessed on punctuality, productivity, teamwork skills, positive work ethic and the adherence to class and school rules.

Commitment - Being a productive student at Bear River takes effort, time and commitment. World History is an important core academic class that requires initiative, critical thinking and determination. There are a wide variety of activities, films, cooperative learning exercises, debates and discussions that promise to keep the class stimulating and interesting.
